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Comment period opens for environmental review of sulfide-ore copper mining threat to Boundary Waters Wilderness

Environmental review will determine whether sensitive lands should be removed from the federal mining program

Ely, MN— <u>Today</u>, the United States Forest Service officially announced a two-year pause on mining activities in approximately 234,328 acres of the Superior National Forest, a vital portion of the watershed of the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness and Voyageurs National Park. The announcement starts a 90-day period for the public to comment on the Forest Service's application for withdrawal of these lands and minerals from the federal leasing program.

This period will help determine the scope for the two-year science-based environmental study of the unique water-based ecosystem of the Boundary Waters and Superior National Forest. The environmental review will guide the decision by the Secretary of the Department of Interior on whether to approve the U.S. Forest Service's application for a 20-year withdrawal.

A public meeting for citizen input will be held during the 90-day comment period on March 16, 2017, in Duluth, MN, at the Duluth Entertainment and Convention Center. <u>Public comments can be made electronically here.</u>

We encourage everyone to participate in the environmental review process."
